Biltz Hall abounds with life, ministry and purpose as the Schroeder Memorial Leadership Center



Forty years ago Biltz Hall was enjoying itself with high school boys involved with pillow fights, water fights, sending bowling balls down the hallway and then the steps, and numerous other pranks. In between all the fun, there was study for classes and sleeping.

Then it appeared Biltz Hall was dying a slow death. The college department closed in 1986 and the high school boys called Brust Hall their campus home. Biltz stood silent, visited only by those who had something to store within its walls.

The sleeping structure was occasionally awakened by voices talking about a possible use for the old, but sturdy, building. Dreams, hopes, and prayers were flashed up and down the halls. There was talk of conference rooms, overnight rooms each with a private bath, and even meals prepared and served. To Biltz Hall this was indeed someone's dream. But the reality to Biltz Hall was that it would stand till it fell or was knocked down.

The torn, tattered, dusty, and dying Biltz Hall heard it was in for a major operation. Its insides (walls, tile, ceilings, plumbing) would all be removed. By means of plastic surgery, new walls, refinished

floors, new plumbing, new lighting, and modern technology would be installed. Painful as the surgery might be, there was hope for a better and fulfilling life. Biltz Hall would again have life and laughter, meaning and ministry.

On January 1, 2004, demolition was started. All stored items had to find a new home. Interior walls were knocked down, floor tile was scraped up, and restroom fixtures were removed. Everything on the inside was removed.

The \$3.1 million renovation of Biltz Hall started on October 1, 2004, and was completed and ready for use in May 2005. Though the inside appearance is quite different from the past, the hall, designed for professional and lay leadership training, is alive and well, ready to take on ministry in 2006 and beyond.

From the Executive Director



This past month I dug around in the old vault looking for the blueprints to our “Kaepfel Auditorium.” Like Biltz Hall, Kaepfel was built in 1925 and was state of the art at the time. Today, not only are we looking at a major remodel of Kaepfel, but we want to remodel the gymnasium (Weis) that replaced it in 1960.

The benefit of looking among old blueprints is finding all the old “Master Plans” of days gone by. The campus plans of the 20’s are much different from those of the 50’s and 60’s. There were some plans that showed where more than a half dozen more “boys” dorms would be located. There were plans for libraries, bowling alleys, a student union and a stand-alone chapel. I can show you how the “infirmary” was to be part of a second floor above Krueger Dining Hall.

There have been lots of dreams for this place, a lot of prayers, and a lot of work that has gone into what has become the alma mater to thousands of men and women all over the world. I still think that as a campus, ours continues to be one of the most beautiful ones I’ve been on. As one who is responsible for keeping it that way, I know that we have a lot of work to do to bring it up to its optimum potential.

But more important than the buildings that grace our campus, I find that the people who have filled those buildings over the years are really what make this place special. We have former students stop by once in a while, and they want to look at such things as their old dorm room where they spilled perfume that ate through the tile. Sooner or later, however, it comes back to people.

There were the professors who made their impression on them as they became prepared for life in the kingdom of God. There were the fellow students and classmates who shared not only their living space, mealtimes and wardrobes, but they shared their common experience and faith.

Today as we set about the task of preparing our future leaders to declare Christ to a dying world, it won’t be because we have pretty buildings or huge libraries or any physical thing. The future of Saint Paul depends on what it has always depended on: the Word of God which sinful human beings called instructors have the privilege of teaching. What a blessing to have had so many fantastic professors over the past 120+ years, and what a legacy we want to continue to provide.

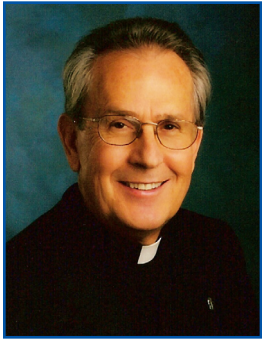
LWML’ers stop by SPLHS booth

From the Association President...



Be grateful for (and promote) Christ-centered education!

Several weeks ago I listened as two mothers told me what their freshman college students were confronted with during orientation week at our public universities. Professors made it clear to them that they must be tolerant of alternative life-styles with all that implies. They told the students that since they would be sexually active, they

should practice safe sex by using condoms, and then peppered the students with them. They told the students that evolution was the accepted basis for scientific thought in their institutions and that only unenlightened and uneducated people believed in the Bible's story of Creation. One of the students whose nervous system reacted to this confrontational orientation with panic attacks and depression, sought help from the student health service and was prescribed mind-altering drugs to mask the depression. Fortunately, she never filled the prescription, but sought the counsel of other Christians, thereby making it safely through those first harrowing weeks.

It's a scenario that would not be acceptable at one of our Concordia Universities.

Again, just this week, a community event for youths and their parents was hosted by the churches of Jefferson City in which a Christian comedian addressed the group on the subject of sexual abstinence. In his presentation he asked the teens and pre-teens to raise their hands if they knew someone who was sexually active. Over half the hands were raised. I was saddened for our young people. I hate that they have to be confronted with these kinds of influences as they make their way through life.

I'm grateful that I'm not a young person needing to make life choices in this sex-saturated culture. I'm also grateful that our children have made it safely through this turbulent period of their lives. I am humbly thankful for the Christian education that was given me from grammar school through graduate school. In addition, I can't thank God enough for the opportunities my wife and I were given to send our children through Christian grade school, St. Paul Lutheran High School and college. These years are critical in the formation of a person's life. When classroom instruction is in tune with God's Word, the blessings that flow from this educational experience are tremendous.

St. Paul Lutheran High continues in the finest Lutheran-Christian tradition as it seeks to shape the lives of our congregations' young people and others. As such, it is one of our Church's jewels in the amazing treasure that has been bequeathed us for raising up another generation for Christ.

I encourage you to support this school with your prayers and gifts so that others, too, may have the benefits that you and I presently enjoy as a result of the St. Paul experience.'

Dajon Ferrell tells recruits: "You're in the Army now!"

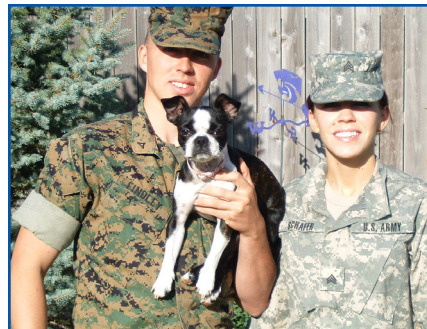
If you were to enlist in the Army, your recruitment officer may bring you to Dajon Ferrell Schafer (SPLHS 2001), who is in charge of a Recruit Sustainment Program Site in Moorhead, Minnesota.

Dajon knows the feelings and emotions of an enlistee. She was one back in 2003. After her basic training, she volunteered for a mission in Bosnia. She was placed in a military police slot at the U.S. National Intelligence Cell on a NATO post.

She recalls, "This gave me the opportunity to meet a lot of people. I received coins from two- and three-Star Generals and even one 4-Star General, B.B. Bell, the U.S. Army European Commander. I was invited to eat Thanksgiving dinner with former NATO Secretary General George Robertson and Major General Packett.

While in Bosnia, Dajon took some college courses that taught her about the genocide (some 8,000 Bosnian Muslim boys and men were massacred when Serbians overran an area that was supposed to be protected by the U.N.) that occurred, as well as some classes on terrorism and the Koran.

"The language skills came in handy when I made visits to a local orphanage. They really appreciated it. Needless to say, I learned a lot and it was definitely a rewarding experience."

While in Bosnia, she met her husband Mike, who is an Air Traffic Controller in the Minnesota Army National Guard. "That's how I ended up in Bosnia," she explained. "He recently graduated from the school of Aerospace Sciences at the University of North Dakota, is a flight instructor at UND, and just received

Back in the States, Dajon is a Recruit Sustainment Non-Commissioned Officer. "I am in charge of a Recruit Sustainment Program Site in Moorhead, Minnesota. I have 200 trainees assigned to my site. When they enlist, their recruiter brings them to me. I make sure that all of their shipper documents are good to go. That includes

dealing with any legal issues, pregnancies, education issues, etc.

"I have trainees that live as far as five hours away from me. So I've definitely seen my fair share of Minnesota. I drive recruits to GED testing, work on weight loss issues, visit high schools to make sure they are on track to graduate, and, of course, return to my office to record all that information. The Army loves reports!

"On drill weekends, I have about a dozen cadre who help out with the training. We teach the recruits about rank structure, drill and ceremonies, first aid, land navigation, and other basic soldier skills.

"They also take a physical fitness test each month. The training they receive with our program prepares them for their initial Active Duty Training.

"It's amazing to see these recruits make the transformation from civilian to a fully trained soldier. Sometimes they are shipped straight to Iraq when they return from their training, so it's vital we instill pride and the seven Army Values in these new soldiers — Loyalty, Duty, Respect, Selfless Service, Honesty, Integrity, and Personal Courage."

In her spare time Dajon works promotional events with a group called Motorsports Mafia. The latest promotional has been a Jim Bean Original Chopper built by Lefty Bros. Cycles (handcrafted by actual military special forces veterans) and customized by Driven Customs.

Dajon recently competed in the Hawaiian Tropic Pageants in both North Dakota and Minnesota. In the North Dakota finals in August, formal wear and bikini, Dajon placed runner-up. At the Minnesota finals in September, she placed in the Top Ten. There is no trip to Hawaii, but Dajon will be back next year for the competition.

For all that Dajon does, it is evident that her heart is with the Army and her recruits.

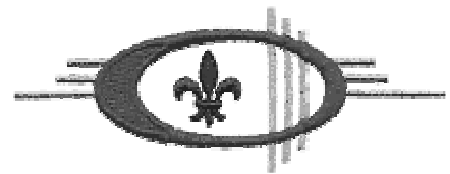
